Davies Reproductive rights have come under
attack before, but never before have so many
people been surprised to discover they exist
at all. Today is International Women's Day,
and to mark it, the headlines in some of the
papers have been about the issue of choice.
These are not usually the newspapers that the
Daily Telegraph or the Daily Mail would buy.
But choice is a concept that feminists hold
dear – and like many people of my
generation, I still struggle to fathom how the
human body could possibly have a choice

about reproduction. When I was a teenager, I attended a combined day and boarding school, where sex education was limited to about 15 minutes on reproductive anatomy. I had to do a pregnancy test on the morning of my 16th birthday, when I found out I was pregnant. I remember asking the teacher if I would have a choice in whether or not to keep the baby, and, to my surprise, he agreed that I would. The next day, I had an abortion and never discussed the matter with anyone. Having had my own abortion, I am very sympathetic to those who have experienced the pain and trauma of unwanted pregnancy. The negative experience of abortion is something I discuss frequently, with friends and strangers. Some are angry and some are

ashamed. But the reason women have abortions is not because they have no other choice, it's because they are already facing some form of sexual assault. And, from my experience, sexual assault and abortion are related. I've interviewed women in my speaking tour who have reported being raped or sexually assaulted before, only to be told by doctors that they should have an abortion because they don't have enough time to take the necessary medication to make sure the pregnancy remains dormant. I know women in the movement who have had abortions after being sexually assaulted. And I am furious about the fact that many women have abortions without telling their family or friends, because of social pressure. In my

opinion, the abortion rate among victims of sexual assault is higher than it is for any other reason. Women who are sexually assaulted may need abortion more than they need other kinds of health care – for example

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
